2. PRETEND IT'S A CITY







5. GRIZZLY II: REVENGE

One of the more tragic and inexplicable famous person deaths of 2021 was that of actress **Tanya Roberts** at age 71. She may not have been anyone's idea of a skilled thespian (although in her defense, the movies she headlined, which included THE BEASTMASTER, SHEENA



and A VIEW TO A KILL, weren't anyone's idea of quality cinema), but those of you who remember the eighties surely remember Tanya, who went from a CHARLIE'S ANGELS cast member to a mainstream movie star to a big name in the straight-to-video exploitation market in the space of a decade.

The initial reports of Tanya Roberts' death were appallingly jumbled and contradictory. You may recall it being announced and then immediately rescinded, then announced yet again the following day. This is in keeping with the life of an actress that, it seems, was quite enigmatic.

Depending on who you ask, Ms. Roberts was either a sweet natured saint or a promiscuous troublemaker. Among the latter claimants is John Hancock, who directed Tanya in CALIFORNIA DREAMIN' (1978), and in the book HANCOCK ON HANCOCK claims she not only tried to seduce him but also "got into the head of" one of the film's other cast members, actor John Calvin, who apparently "allowed himself to be misled on the film... mostly by his dick!" The latter, for the record, categorically denies Hancock's claims (yes, I spoke with Mr. Calvin about this directly) so who knows where the truth about Tanya Roberts may lie?
